8	—-TITLE/PURPOSES			
9 10	Section 1. This set shall be known as the "Conital Improvement			
11	Section 1. This act shall be known as the "Capital Improvement Appropriations Act of 1989".			
12	Sec. 2. The appropriations made by the 1989 General Assembly for capital			
13	improvements are for constructing, repairing or renovating State buildings, utilities, and			
14	other capital facilities, for acquiring sites for them where necessary, and for acquiring			
15	buildings and land for State government purposes.

17	—-PROCEDURES FOR DISBURSEMENTS			

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Sec. 3. The appropriations made by the 1989 General Assembly for capital improvements shall be disbursed for the purposes provided by this act. Expenditure of funds shall not be made by any State department, institution or agency, until an allotment has been approved by the Governor as Director of the Budget. The allotment shall be approved only after full compliance with the Executive Budget Act, Article 1 of Chapter 143 of the General Statutes. Prior to the award of construction contracts for projects to be financed in whole or in part with self-liquidating appropriations, the Director of the Budget shall approve the elements of the method of financing of those projects including the source of funds, interest rate, and liquidation period. Provided, however, that if the Director of the Budget approves the method of financing a project, he shall report that action to the Joint Legislative Commission on Governmental Operations at its next meeting.

Where direct capital improvement appropriations include the purpose of furnishing fixed and movable equipment for any project, those funds for equipment shall not be subject to transfer into construction accounts except as authorized by the Director of the Budget. The expenditure of funds for fixed and movable equipment and furnishings shall be reviewed and approved by the Director of the Budget prior to commitment of funds.

Capital improvement projects authorized by the 1989 General Assembly shall be completed, including fixed and movable equipment and furnishings, within the limits of the amounts of the direct or self-liquidating appropriations provided, except as otherwise provided in this act.

—-STUDY COMMISSION ON THE FUTURE OF EDUCATION

- Sec. 6. (a) The Study Commission on the Future of Education is created. The Commission shall be located administratively within the Department of Public Education. The Commission shall consist of 48 members appointed as follows:
 - (1) Three members of the General Assembly, three educators, three representatives of business or industry, and three citizens who are none of the above, appointed by the Governor;
 - Three members of the General Assembly, three educators, three representatives of business or industry, and three citizens who are none of the above, appointed by the State Superintendent of Public Instruction;
 - (3) Three members of the General Assembly, three educators, three representatives of business or industry, and three citizens who are none of the above, appointed by the President Pro Tempore of the Senate; and
 - (4) Three members of the General Assembly, three educators, three representatives of business or industry, and three citizens who are none of the above, appointed by the Speaker of the House of Representatives.
- (b) The State Superintendent of Public Instruction shall designate a chairman of the Commission.
 - (c) The Commission shall:
 - (1) Study all recent education initiatives and goals, including the Basic Education Program and the Career Development Pilot Program;
 - (2) Hold public hearings throughout the State on whether and how the State should implement or continue to implement these initiatives and goals; and
 - (3) Determine which of these initiatives and goals the State should implement or continue to implement; how they should be implemented to improve the quality of the State education system and to prepare young people to be well-educated, productive citizens; and how they should be funded.
- (d) The Commission shall submit an interim report of its findings and recommendations to the Governor, the State Superintendent of Public Instruction and

the General Assembly on or before May 1, 1990. The Commission shall submit a final report of its findings and recommendations to the Governor, the State Superintendent of Public Instruction, and the General Assembly on or before January 1, 1991. Upon filing its final report, the Commission shall terminate.

- (e) Members of the Commission who are legislators shall receive subsistence and travel expenses at the rates set forth in G.S. 120-3.1. Members who are officials or employees of the State shall be paid subsistence and travel allowances at the rates set forth in G.S. 138-6. Other members of the Commission shall be paid per diem, subsistence, and travel allowances at the rates established in G.S. 138-5.
- (f) The Commission may contract for professional, clerical, or consultant services as it considers appropriate.

The report shall include information on which contractors have been selected, what contracts have been entered into, the projected and actual occupancy dates of facilities contracted for, the number of prison beds to be constructed on each project, the location of each project, and the projected and actual cost of each project.
- (c) The Office of State Budget and Management and the Department of Correction shall provide quarterly reports to the Chairmen of the Appropriations Committee and the Base Budget Committee in the Senate, the Chairman of the Appropriations Committee in the House, the Joint Legislative Commission on Governmental Operations, and the Fiscal Research Division on expenditures of funds

appropriated by the 1989 General Assembly for capital projects of the Department of Correction. The reports shall include information on the location and the projected and actual cost of each project, both on contract and in-house, which contractors have been selected and what contracts have been entered into, and the projected and actual occupancy dates of the facilities. These reports shall continue to be made until the completion of these projects.

—CENTER FOR COMMUNITY SELF-HELP FUNDS

Sec. 29. (a) Of the funds appropriated in Section 5.1 of this act to the Office of State Budget and Management to the Center for Community Self-Help \$2,000,000 for the 1989-90 fiscal year shall be used for the purpose of furthering a revolving loan program of lending, to be leveraged at a 24 to 1 ratio with other funds for homeownership to low and moderate income families in North Carolina. Loans made under the program shall be conditioned on the unavailability of mortgage loans for the same purposes from private lenders upon reasonably equivalent terms and conditions. Payments of principal shall be available for further loans.

- (c) The Center for Community Self-Help shall report to the Joint Legislative Commission on Governmental Operations, the House and Senate Appropriations Committees on Natural and Economic Resources, and the Department of Commerce on a quarterly basis for the life of the revolving fund as to the status of the home-ownership lending program. The report shall include: the amount of total monies available; the amount of total monies loaned; the total number of homes financed; and the income of the borrowers.
- (d) The Office of State Auditor may conduct an annual end-of-year audit of the revolving fund for home ownership lending of the Center for Community Self-Help for each year of the life of the revolving fund.
- (e) If the Center for Community Self-Help dissolves, the corporation will transfer the remaining assets of the revolving fund to the State and will refrain from disposing of the revolving fund assets without approval of the State Treasurer.

When each capital improvement project appropriated by the 1989 General Assembly, other than those projects under The University of North Carolina Board of Governors, is placed under construction contract, direct appropriations shall be encumbered to include all costs for construction, design, investigation, administration, movable equipment and a reasonable contingency. Unencumbered direct appropriations remaining in the project budget shall be placed in a project reserve fund credited to the Office of State Budget and Management. Funds in the project reserve may be used for emergency repair and renovation projects at State facilities with the approval of the Director of the Budget. The project reserve fund may be used, at the discretion of the Director of the Budget, to allow for award of contracts where bids exceed appropriated funds, if those projects supplemented were designed within the scope intended by the applicable appropriation or any authorized change in it, and if, in the opinion of the Director of the Budget, all means to award contracts within the appropriation were reasonably attempted. At the discretion of the Director of the Budget any balances in the project reserve fund shall revert to the original source.

—-PROJECT COST INCREASE

Sec. 33. Upon the request of the administration of a State department or institution, the Director of the Budget may, when in his opinion it is in the best interest of the State to do so, increase the cost of a capital improvement project. Provided, however, that if the Director of the Budget increases the cost of a project, he shall report that action to the Joint Legislative Commission on Governmental Operations at its next meeting. The increase may be funded from gifts, federal or private grants, special fund

receipts, excess patient receipts above those budgeted at North Carolina Memorial Hospital, or direct capital improvement appropriations to that department or institution.

—-NEW PROJECT AUTHORIZATION

Sec. 34. Upon the request of the administration of any State department or institution, the Governor may authorize the construction of a capital improvement project not specifically authorized by the General Assembly if such project is to be funded by gifts, federal or private grants, special fund receipts, excess patient receipts above those budgeted at North Carolina Memorial Hospital, or self-liquidating indebtedness. Provided, however, that if the Director of the Budget authorizes the construction of such a capital improvement project, he shall report that action to the Joint Legislative Commission on Governmental Operations at its next meeting.

—-ADVANCE PLANNING OF CAPITAL IMPROVEMENT PROJECTS

Sec. 35. Funds which become available by gifts, excess patient receipts above those budgeted at North Carolina Memorial Hospital, federal or private grants, receipts becoming a part of special funds by act of the General Assembly or any other funds available to a State department or institution may be utilized for advance planning through the working drawing phase of capital improvement projects, upon approval of the Director of the Budget. The Director of the Budget may make allocations from the Advance Planning Fund for advance planning through the working drawing phase of capital improvement projects, except that this revolving fund may not be utilized by the Board of Governors of The University of North Carolina or the State Board of Community Colleges.

—-APPROPRIATIONS LIMITS/REVERSION OR LAPSE

Sec. 36. Except as permitted in previous sections of this act, the appropriations for capital improvements made by the 1989 General Assembly may be expended only for specific projects set out by the 1989 General Assembly and for no other purpose. Construction of all capital improvement projects enumerated by the 1989 General Assembly shall be commenced or self-liquidating indebtedness with respect to them shall be incurred within 12 months following the first day of the fiscal year in which the funds are available. If construction contracts on those projects have not been awarded or self-liquidating indebtedness has not been incurred within that period, the direct appropriation for those projects shall revert to the original source, and the self-liquidating appropriation shall lapse; except that direct appropriations may be placed in a reserve fund as authorized in Section 32 of this act. This deadline with respect to both direct and self-liquidating appropriations may be extended up to an additional 12 months if circumstances and conditions warrant such extension.
