1	A BILL TO BE ENTITLED
2	AN ACT TO MAKE APPROPRIATIONS TO PROVIDE CAPITAL
3	IMPROVEMENTS FOR STATE DEPARTMENTS, INSTITUTIONS, AND
4	AGENCIES, EXCEPT FOR AID TO CERTAIN GOVERNMENTAL AND
5	NONGOVERNMENTAL ENTITIES.
6	The General Assembly of North Carolina enacts:
7	
8	—-TITLE/PURPOSES
9	
10	Section 1. This act shall be known as the "Capital Improvement
11	Appropriations Act of 1989".
12	Sec. 2. The appropriations made by the 1989 General Assembly for capital
13	improvements are for constructing, repairing or renovating State buildings, utilities, and
14	other capital facilities, for acquiring sites for them where necessary, and for acquiring
15	buildings and land for State government purposes.
16	
17	—-PROCEDURES FOR DISBURSEMENTS
18	
19	Sec. 3. The appropriations made by the 1989 General Assembly for capital
20	improvements shall be disbursed for the purposes provided by this act. Expenditure of
21	funds shall not be made by any State department, institution or agency, until an
22	allotment has been approved by the Governor as Director of the Budget. The allotment

1 shall be approved only after full compliance with the Executive Budget Act, Article 1 of 2 Chapter 143 of the General Statutes. Prior to the award of construction contracts for projects to be financed in whole or in part with self-liquidating appropriations, the 3 Director of the Budget shall approve the elements of the method of financing of those 4 5 projects including the source of funds, interest rate, and liquidation period. Provided, 6 however, that if the Director of the Budget approves the method of financing a project, 7 he shall report that action to the Joint Legislative Commission on Governmental 8 Operations at its next meeting. 9 Where direct capital improvement appropriations include the purpose of 10 furnishing fixed and movable equipment for any project, those funds for equipment shall not be subject to transfer into construction accounts except as authorized by the 11 Director of the Budget. The expenditure of funds for fixed and movable equipment and 12 13 furnishings shall be reviewed and approved by the Director of the Budget prior to 14 commitment of funds. 15 Capital improvement projects authorized by the 1989 General Assembly shall 16 be completed, including fixed and movable equipment and furnishings, within the limits 17 of the amounts of the direct or self-liquidating appropriations provided, except as 18 otherwise provided in this act. 19 20 ----CAPITAL IMPROVEMENTS/GENERAL FUND 21 22 Sec. 4.
