A BILL TO BE ENTITLED

1 AN ACT TO ESTABLISH UNIFORM PRINCIPLES TO APPLY WHEN
2 ACCOUNTING FOR FEES, TO MAKE CONFORMING CHANGES TO
3 VARIOUS FEES IN ACCORDANCE WITH THESE PRINCIPLES, AND TO
4 CORRECT CROSS REFERENCES TO THE CURRENT OPERATIONS
5 APPROPRIATIONS ACT.

7 The General Assembly of North Carolina enacts:

8 Section 1. Article 1 of Chapter 143 of the General Statutes is amended by
9 adding the following section to read:

10 "**§ 143-18.2. How revenue from certain fees is to be treated.**

11 The following principles apply to a fee payable to the Department of Environment,
12 Health, and Natural Resources or a commission, board, or other agency that is located in
13 that Department:

- 14 (1) A fee is a departmental receipt unless a law states that it is nontax
15 revenue.
16 (2) A fee reverts to the General Fund at the end of a fiscal year unless a
17 law states that the fee does not revert.
18 (3) A statement that a fee shall be used for a certain purpose is not a
19 statement that the fee does not revert.

1 (4) Interest and other investment income earned by a nonreverting fee
2 account is credited to the General Fund unless a law states that the
3 income is to be credited to the nonreverting fee account."

4 Sec. 2. G.S. 143-18.2, as enacted by this act, reads as rewritten:

24 ~~information requested by the General Assembly or the Commission.~~

26 pursuant to this Article to assess fees for the approval of erosion control plans."

27 Sec. 6. G.S. 113A-119.1 reads as rewritten:

28 "**§ 113A-119.1. Permit Fees.**

29 (a) The Commission shall have the power to establish a graduated fee schedule
30 for the processing of applications for permits, ~~renewal-renewals~~ of permits, ~~modification~~
31 modifications of permits, or transfers of permits issued pursuant to this Article. In
32 determining the fee schedule, the Commission shall consider the administrative and
33 personnel costs incurred by the Department for processing ~~such applications and for the~~
34 applications, related compliance activities ~~activities,~~ and the complexity of the
35 development sought to be undertaken for which a permit is required under this Article.
36 The fee to be charged for processing an application may not exceed four hundred dollars

 38 shall be deposited in a separate nonreverting fund within the Office of State Budget to be used,
 39 subject to appropriation by the General Assembly, to pay a portion of the State's share of the
 40 cost of the hazardous waste management program. credited to the Account and shall be used

42 Sec. 12. G.S. 130A-326(7) reads as rewritten:

(a) ~~There is established a separate~~ The Water and Air Quality Account is established as a nonreverting account within the Department of Environment, Health, and Natural Resources. The account may be used, to the extent appropriated by the General Assembly, to (i) defray the expenses of any project or program supporting the permitting and compliance activities needed to protect the State's surface water, groundwater, and air quality, and (ii) establish additional permanent positions, under the Personnel Act, for water, groundwater, and air quality permitting and compliance activities. All Department. Revenue in the Account shall be applied to the costs of administering the programs for which the fees were collected.
