A BILL TO BE ENTITLED

AN ACT TO ESTABLISH A COMMISSION TO STUDY THE EFFECT OF THE EXCLUSION OF AGRICULTURE FROM WORKERS' COMPENSATION COVERAGE.

The General Assembly of North Carolina enacts:

Section 1. There is created the Study Commission on Workers' Compensation Coverage in Agriculture, an independent Commission, to make recommendations on what the State and non-State entities can do to meet the needs of farmers and farmworkers regarding on-the-job injuries in agriculture.

The Commission will consist of 15 members as follows: the Chairman of the Industrial Commission or his designee, the Commissioner of Labor or his designee, and the Secretary of the Department of Environment, Health, and Natural Resources or his designee shall serve ex officio. The President Pro Tempore of the Senate shall appoint six members as follows: three members of the Senate and three public members, of whom one shall be an agricultural employer or representative of the interests of agricultural employers, one shall be an expert in agricultural economics in the State, and one shall be an administrator or a licensed health care professional employed by a hospital in an area of the State with a significant migrant and seasonal farmworker population. The Speaker of the House of Representatives shall appoint six members as follows: three members of the House of Representatives and three public members, of whom one shall be a representative of an organization that advocates for migrant and seasonal farmworkers, one shall be an employee or representative of an entity which

receives funding under 42 U.S.C. section 329, the Federal Migrant Health Act, and one shall be an expert in rural sociology and/or anthropology in the State.

- Sec. 2. The President Pro Tempore of the Senate shall designate one Senator as cochair and the Speaker of the House of Representatives shall designate one Representative as cochair of the Commission.
- Sec. 3. The Commission shall obtain information, study and make findings and recommendations on the following issues:
 - (1) The impact on the State of the current scope of coverage of farmworkers under the Workers' Compensation Act, including, but not limited to:
 - a. The impact on State-funded health care services and systems,
 - b. The impact on private or quasi-private health care providers;
 - (2) The impact of the current scope of coverage on access to health care and the quality and continuity of such care for agricultural workers injured on the job;
 - (3) The economic impact of work-related injuries on agricultural employers in terms of lost production and other related costs;
 - (4) The scope of coverage in other states and the economic and healthrelated impact of the inclusion of agriculture in the workers' compensation systems in states such as Florida, Texas, California, and Washington which have an agricultural work force comparable in numbers to that of North Carolina;
 - (5) The cost of different types of coverage to agricultural employers;
 - (6) The cost to the State of administering the claims that would be brought under any proposed expansion of coverage for agricultural workers;
 - (7) The impact of voluntary coverage on those agricultural employers in the State who have opted to purchase coverage; and
 - (8) To study any other issues pertinent to the costs, benefits, and desirability of extending the current scope of workers' compensation coverage in agriculture.
- Sec. 4. The Commission shall submit a final report of its findings and recommendations to the General Assembly on or before the first day of the 1993 Session of the General Assembly by filing the report with the President Pro Tempore of the Senate and the Speaker of the House of Representatives. Upon filing its final report, the Commission shall terminate.
- Sec. 5. The Commission, while in the discharge of official duties, may exercise all the powers provided for under the provisions of G.S. 120-19 and G.S. 120-19.1 through G.S. 120-19.4. The Commission may meet at any time upon the joint call of the cochairs. The Commission may meet in the Legislative Office Building.
- Sec. 6. Members of the Commission shall receive subsistence and travel expenses at the rate set forth in G.S. 120-3.1, 138-5, and 138-6, as applicable.
- Sec. 7. The Commission may contract for professional, clerical, or consultant services as provided by G.S. 120-32.02. The Legislative Services Commission, through the Legislative Administrative Officer, shall assign professional staff to assist in the

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work of the Commission.	The expenses relating to cleric	ical employees shall be borne by
the Commission.		

- Sec. 8. When a vacancy occurs in the membership of the Commission, the vacancy shall be filled by the same appointing officer who made the initial appointment.
- Sec. 9. All State departments and agencies and local governments and their subdivisions shall furnish the Commission with any information in their possession or available to them.
- Sec. 10. There is appropriated from the General Fund to the General Assembly the sum of \$15,000 for the 1991-92 fiscal year and the sum of \$15,000 for the 1992-93 fiscal year for the expenses of the Commission.
 - Sec. 11. This act becomes effective July 1, 1991.
