A BILL TO BE ENTITLED

AN ACT TO MAKE TECHNICAL AMENDMENTS TO THE ALCOHOLIC BEVERAGE LAWS, TO AUTHORIZE THE SALE OF ALCOHOLIC BEVERAGES IN CERTAIN AREAS OF THE STATE, TO INCREASE THE FEES FOR MOST COMMERCIAL ALCOHOLIC BEVERAGE PERMITS, AND TO MAKE OTHER CHANGES TO THE ALCOHOLIC BEVERAGE LAWS.

The General Assembly of North Carolina enacts:

Section 1. G.S. 18B-101(13a) reads as rewritten:

"(13a) 'Special ABC area' means an area ~~in a city or county, either unincorporated or incorporated, with less than 500 permanent residents that:~~

- (1) ~~Borders on another state;~~
- (2) ~~Where ABC stores are permitted in one or more cities in the county;~~
- (3) ~~Where the on-premises or off-premises sale of unfortified wines and malt beverages by qualified persons and establishments, including persons and establishments qualified under G.S. 18B-603(c) or G.S. 18B-603(d), is permitted countywide or in two or more cities in the county; and such area that meets all of the following requirements:~~
 - a. Has fewer than 500 permanent residents.

1 b. Is located in a county that borders another state, that has
2 at least one city that has approved the operation of an
3 ABC store, and in which the sale of unfortified wine and
4 malt beverages is permitted countywide or in at least two
5 cities.

6 ~~(a)c.~~ Contains more than ~~500~~200 contiguous acres
7 and is made up of privately-owned land and land
8 owned by an association or a club ~~having that is~~
9 exempt from income tax on its membership
10 income under Article 4 of Chapter 105 of the
11 General Statutes, has more than 200 members
12 ~~and members, was created for municipal and~~
13 ~~recreational purposes; purposes, and, (b) Which~~
14 for three or more ~~years~~years, has levied
15 assessments or dues and provided municipal
16 ~~services; and services.~~

17 ~~(e) Is incorporated as a municipality or has within such area~~
18 ~~a private association or club that has been determined or~~
19 ~~is treated by the Internal Revenue Service to be exempt~~
20 ~~from tax on member source or exempt function income."~~

21 Sec. 2. G.S. 18B-101 is amended by adding a new subdivision to read:

22 "(14a) 'Tourism ABC establishment' means a restaurant or hotel that is
23 located within 1.5 miles of the end of an entrance or exit ramp of any
24 junction on a national scenic parkway designed to attract local, State,
25 national, and international tourists and is located in a county in which
26 the on-premises sale of malt beverages or unfortified wine is
27 authorized in at least one city in the county."

28 Sec. 3. G.S. 18B-200(d) reads as rewritten:

29 "(d) Employees. – The Commission may authorize the chairman to employ,
30 discharge, and otherwise supervise subordinate personnel of the Commission. The
31 Commission shall appoint at least one ~~hearing officer with authority employee~~
32 investigations, hold hearings, and hearings requested under G.S. 18B-1205, and represent
33 the Commission in contested case hearings or perform any other duties authorized by
34 Chapter 150B."

35 Sec. 4. G.S. 18B-201(a) reads as rewritten:

36 "(a) Financial Interests Restricted. – No person shall be appointed to or employed by
37 the Commission, a local board, or the ALE ~~Division, Division~~ if that person or a
38 member of ~~his household that person's family~~ related to ~~him that person~~ by blood or
39 marriage to the first degree has or controls, directly or indirectly, a financial interest in
40 any commercial alcoholic beverage enterprise, including any business required to have
41 an ABC permit. The Commission may exempt from this provision any person, other
42 than a Commission member, when the financial interest in question is so insignificant or
43 remote that it is unlikely to affect the person's official actions in any way. Exemptions
44 may be granted only to individuals, not to groups or classes of people, and each

1 exemption shall be in writing, be available for public inspection, and contain a
2 statement of the financial interest in question."

3 Sec. 5. G.S. 18B-503 reads as rewritten:

4 **"§ 18B-503. Disposition of seized alcoholic beverages.**

5 (a) Storage. – A law-enforcement officer who seizes alcoholic beverages as
6 evidence of an ABC law violation shall provide for the storage of those alcoholic
7 beverages until the commencement of the trial or administrative hearing relating to the
8 violation, unless some other disposition is authorized under this section.

9 (b) Disposition Before Trial. – After giving notice to each defendant, to any other
10 known owner, and to the Commission, a judge may ~~make order~~ any of the following
11 dispositions of alcoholic beverages seized as evidence of an ABC law violation:

12 (1) ~~He shall order the~~ The destruction of any malt beverages except that
13 amount needed for evidence at trial.

14 (2) ~~He may order the~~ The sale of any alcoholic beverages other than malt
15 beverages or nontaxpaid alcoholic beverages, and other than any
16 alcoholic beverages needed for evidence at trial, if the trial is likely to
17 be delayed for more than 90 days, or if the quantity or nature of the
18 alcoholic beverages is such that storage is impractical or unduly
19 expensive.

20 (3) ~~He may order~~ The destruction of the alcoholic beverages if storage or
21 sale is not practical.

22 (4) ~~He may order continued~~ Continued storage of the alcoholic beverages.

23 (c) Disposition After Trial. – After the criminal charge is resolved, a judge may
24 order the following dispositions of seized alcoholic beverages:

25 (1) If the owner or possessor of the alcoholic beverages is found guilty of
26 a criminal charge relating to those alcoholic beverages, the judge may
27 order the sale or destruction of any alcoholic beverages that were held
28 until trial.

29 (2) If the owner or possessor of the alcoholic beverages is found not
30 guilty, or if charges are dismissed or otherwise resolved in ~~his favor,~~
31 favor of the owner or possessor, the judge shall order the alcoholic
32 beverages returned to that owner or possessor, except as provided in
33 subdivision (3).

34 (3) If the owner or possessor of the alcoholic beverages is found not
35 guilty, or if charges are otherwise resolved in ~~his favor,~~ favor of the
36 owner or possessor, but possession of the alcoholic beverages by ~~him~~
37 that owner or possessor would be unlawful, the judge shall order the
38 alcoholic beverages either sold or destroyed.

39 (4) If ownership of the alcoholic beverages remains uncertain after trial or
40 after the charges have been dismissed, the judge may order the
41 alcoholic beverages held, or the alcoholic beverages sold and the
42 proceeds held, for a specified time, until ownership of the alcoholic
43 beverages can be determined.

1 (d) Holding for Administrative Hearings. – If alcoholic beverages used as
2 evidence in a criminal proceeding are also needed as evidence at an administrative
3 hearing, a judge shall not order any of the dispositions set out in subsection (c), but shall
4 order the alcoholic beverages held for the administrative hearing and for a determination
5 of final disposition by the ~~Commission or one of its hearing officers. A hearing officer for the~~
6 Commission. The Commission may, before or after an administrative hearing, order any
7 of the dispositions authorized under subsections (b) and (c). If no related criminal
8 proceeding has commenced, the Commission ~~or its hearing officers~~ shall not order sale or
9 destruction of alcoholic beverages until notice has been given to the district attorney for
10 the district where the alcoholic beverages were seized or any violation of ABC laws
11 related to the seizure of the alcoholic beverages is likely to be prosecuted.

12 (e) Sale Procedure. – The sale of unfortified wine or fortified wine shall be by
13 public auction unless those wines would likely become spoiled or lose value in the time
14 required to arrange a public auction. If spoilage or loss of value is likely, the judge ~~or~~
15 ~~hearing officer~~ ordering the sale or the Commission may authorize sale at the prevailing
16 wholesale price, as determined by the Commission, to one or more persons holding the
17 appropriate retail wine permits in the county in which the wine was seized, or in a
18 neighboring county if there are no such persons in the county in which the wine was
19 seized. Spirituous liquor may be sold only to the local ABC board serving the city or
20 county in which the liquor was seized, or, if there is no local board for that city or
21 county, to the nearest local board. The sale price shall be at least ten percent (10%) less
22 than the price the local board would pay for the same liquor bought through the State
23 warehouse.

24 (f) Sale Proceeds. – An agency selling alcoholic beverages seized under the
25 provisions of this Chapter shall keep the proceeds in a separate account until some other
26 disposition is ordered by a judge or ~~a Commission hearing officer. If, in the Commission.~~
27 In a criminal proceeding, if the owner or possessor of the alcoholic beverages is found
28 guilty of a violation relating to seizure of the alcoholic beverages, or if he the owner or
29 possessor is found not guilty, or if guilty or the charge is dismissed or otherwise resolved
30 in his favor, favor of the owner or possessor, but the possession of the alcoholic
31 beverages by ~~him~~ that owner or possessor would be unlawful, or if the ownership of the
32 alcoholic beverages cannot be determined, the proceeds from the sale of those alcoholic
33 beverages shall be paid to the school fund of the county in which the alcoholic
34 beverages were seized. If the owner or possessor of alcoholic beverages seized for
35 violation of the ABC laws is found not guilty of criminal charges relating to the seizure
36 of those ~~beverages, or if beverages or~~ beverages or the charge is dismissed or otherwise resolved in ~~his~~
37 ~~favor,~~ favor of the owner or possessor, and if possession of the alcoholic beverages by
38 ~~him~~ that owner or possessor was lawful when the beverages were seized, the proceeds
39 from the sale of those alcoholic beverages shall be paid to ~~him~~ the owner or possessor.
40 The agency making the sale may deduct and retain from the amount to be placed in the
41 county school fund the costs of storing the seized alcoholic beverages and of conducting
42 the sale, but may not deduct those costs from the amount to be turned over to an owner
43 or possessor of the alcoholic beverages.

1 (g) Court Action by Owner. – Any person who ~~has~~ claims any of the following
 2 ~~claims~~ resulting from the seizure of alcoholic beverages may bring an action in the
 3 superior court of the county in which the alcoholic beverages were seized:

- 4 (1) ~~Alcoholic~~ To be the owner of alcoholic beverages owned by him are
 5 ~~wrongfully held; that are wrongfully held.~~
 6 (2) ~~Alcoholic~~ To be the owner of alcoholic beverages owned by him that are
 7 ~~needed as evidence in another proceeding; proceeding.~~
 8 (3) ~~He is~~ To be entitled to proceeds from a sale of seized alcoholic
 9 ~~beverages; beverages.~~
 10 (4) ~~He is~~ To be entitled to restitution for alcoholic beverages wrongfully
 11 ~~destroyed."~~

12 Sec. 6. G.S. 18B-504(e) reads as rewritten:

13 "(e) Disposition after Trial. – The presiding judge in a criminal proceeding for
 14 violation of ABC laws may take the following actions after resolution of a charge
 15 against the owner or possessor of property subject to forfeiture under this section:

- 16 (1) If the owner or possessor of the property is found guilty of an ABC
 17 offense, the judge may order the property forfeited.
 18 (2) If the owner or possessor of the property is found not guilty, or if the
 19 charge is dismissed or otherwise resolved in ~~his favor; favor of the~~
 20 owner or possessor, the judge shall order the property returned to the
 21 owner or possessor.
 22 (3) If ownership of the property remains uncertain after trial, the judge
 23 may order the property held for a specified time to determine
 24 ownership. If the judge finds that ownership cannot be determined
 25 with reasonable effort, ~~he~~ the judge shall order the property forfeited.
 26 (4) Regardless of the disposition of the charge, if the property is
 27 something that may not be possessed lawfully, the judge shall order it
 28 forfeited.
 29 (5) If the property is also needed as evidence at an administrative hearing,
 30 the judge shall provide that ~~his~~ the order does not go into effect until
 31 the Commission ~~or one of its hearing officers~~ determines that the
 32 property is no longer needed for the administrative proceeding."

33 Sec. 7. G.S. 18B-603(d)(4) reads as rewritten:

- 34 "(4) The Commission may issue brown-bagging permits for private clubs
 35 and congressionally chartered veterans organizations but may no
 36 longer issue and may not renew brown-bagging permits for
 37 restaurants, hotels, and community theatres. A restaurant, hotel, or
 38 community theatre may not be issued a mixed beverage permit under
 39 subdivision (1) until it surrenders its brown-bagging permit."

40 Sec. 8. G.S. 18B-603(f) reads as rewritten:

41 "(f) Permits Not Dependent on Elections. – The Commission may issue the
 42 following kinds of permits without approval at an election:

- 43 (1) Special occasion permits;
 44 (2) Limited special occasion permits;

- 1 (3) ~~Brown-bagging permits for private clubs;~~ clubs and congressionally
2 chartered veterans organizations;
- 3 (4) Culinary permits, except as restricted by subdivision (d)(5);
- 4 (5) Special one-time permits issued under G.S. 18B-1002;
- 5 (6) All permits listed in ~~G.S. 18B-1100;~~ G.S. 18B-1100;
- 6 (7) On-premises malt beverage permits and on-premises unfortified wine
7 permits for a tourism ABC establishment."

8 Sec. 9. G.S. 18B-603(h) reads as rewritten:

9 "(h) Permits Based on Existing Permits. – In any county in which the sale of malt
10 beverage on and off premises, the sale of unfortified wine on and off premises, the sale
11 of mixed beverages, and the operation of an ABC system has been allowed in at least
12 six cities in the county, or in any county adjacent to that county in which an ABC
13 system has been allowed and which borders on the Atlantic Ocean, the Commission
14 may issue permits to sports clubs as defined in G.S. 18B-1000(8) throughout the county.
15 The Commission may issue the following permits:

- 16 (1) On and Off Premises Malt Beverage;
- 17 (2) On and Off Premises Unfortified Wine;
- 18 (3) On and Off Premises Fortified Wine; or
- 19 (4) ~~Mixed Beverage.~~ Beverages.

20 ~~Retail establishments holding mixed beverage permits shall purchase their spirituous~~
21 ~~liquor at the nearest municipal ABC system store.~~ The Commission may also issue on-
22 premises malt beverage, unfortified wine, fortified wine and mixed beverages permits to
23 a sports club located in a county adjacent to any county that has approved the sale of
24 mixed beverages pursuant to the last paragraph of G.S. 18B-603(d), if the county in
25 which the sports club is located borders another state and has at least one city that has
26 approved the sale of mixed beverages. Sports clubs holding mixed beverages permits
27 shall purchase their spirituous liquor at the nearest ~~municipal ABC system store that has~~
28 ~~been designated for such purchases.~~ store that is located in the county.

29 The Commission may further issue on-premises malt beverage and on-premises
30 unfortified wine permits to a sports club located in a county bordering on another state
31 that is adjacent to any county in which permits were issued pursuant to this subsection
32 prior to August 1, 1993. The sports clubs must be located in the unincorporated areas of
33 a county, in which the sale of malt beverages and unfortified wine is not permitted, and
34 where there are six or more municipalities in that county where the sale of malt
35 beverages and unfortified wine is permitted."

36 Sec. 10. G.S. 18B-900(c) reads as rewritten:

37 "(c) Who Must Qualify; Exceptions. – For an ABC permit to be issued to and held
38 for a business, each of the following persons associated with that business must qualify
39 under subsection (a):

- 40 (1) The owner of a sole proprietorship;
- 41 (2) Each member of a firm, association or general partnership;
- 42 (2a) Each general partner in a limited partnership;
- 43 (3) Each officer, director and owner of ~~more than~~ twenty-five percent
44 (25%) or more of the stock of a corporation except that the

1 requirement of subdivision (a)(1) does not apply to such an officer,
2 director, or stockholder unless he is a manager or is otherwise
3 responsible for the day-to-day operation of the business;

4 (4) The manager of an establishment operated by a corporation other than
5 an establishment with only off-premises malt beverage, off-premises
6 unfortified wine, or off-premises fortified wine permits;

7 (5) Any manager who has been empowered as attorney-in-fact for a
8 nonresident individual or partnership."

9 Sec. 11. G.S. 18B-902 reads as rewritten:

10 **"§ 18B-902. Application for permit; fees.**

11 (a) Form. – An application for an ABC permit shall be on a form prescribed
12 by the Commission and shall be notarized. The application shall be signed and sworn to
13 by each person required to qualify under G.S. 18B-900(c).

14 (b) Investigation. – Before issuing a new permit, the Commission, with the
15 assistance of the ALE Division, shall investigate the applicant and the premises for
16 which the permit is requested. The Commission may request the assistance of local
17 ABC officers in investigating applications. An applicant shall cooperate fully with the
18 investigation.

19 (c) False Information. – Knowingly making a false statement in an application
20 for an ABC permit shall be grounds for denying, suspending, revoking or taking other
21 action against the permit as provided in G.S. 18B-104 and shall also be unlawful.

22 (d) Fees. – An application for an ABC permit shall be accompanied by payment
23 of the following application fee:

24 (1) On-premises malt beverage permit – \$200.00.

25 (2) Off-premises malt beverage permit – \$200.00.

26 (3) On-premises unfortified wine permit – \$200.00.

27 (4) Off-premises unfortified wine permit – \$200.00.

28 (5) On-premises fortified wine permit – \$200.00.

29 (6) Off-premises fortified wine permit – \$200.00.

30 (7) Brown-bagging permit – \$200.00, unless the application is for a
31 restaurant seating less than 50, in which case the fee shall be \$100.00.

32 (8) Special occasion permit – \$200.00.

33 (9) Limited special occasion permit – \$25.00.

34 (10) Mixed beverages permit – \$750.00.

35 (11) Culinary permit – \$100.00.

36 (12) Unfortified winery permit – ~~\$100.00~~ \$150.00.

37 (13) Fortified winery permit – ~~\$100.00~~ \$150.00.

38 (14) Limited winery permit – ~~\$100.00~~ \$150.00.

39 (15) Brewery permit – ~~\$100.00~~ \$150.00.

40 (16) Distillery permit – ~~\$100.00~~ \$150.00.

41 (17) Fuel alcohol permit – ~~\$10.00~~ \$50.00.

42 (18) Wine importer permit – ~~\$100.00~~ \$150.00.

43 (19) Wine wholesaler permit – ~~\$100.00~~ \$150.00.

44 (20) Malt beverage importer permit – ~~\$100.00~~ \$150.00.

- 1 (21) Malt beverage wholesaler permit —~~\$100.00-~~\$150.00.
2 (22) Bottler permit —~~\$100.00-~~\$150.00.
3 (23) Salesman permit – \$25.00.
4 (24) Vendor representative permit – \$25.00.
5 (25) Nonresident malt beverage vendor permit —~~\$25.00-~~\$50.00.
6 (26) Nonresident wine vendor permit —~~\$25.00-~~\$50.00.
7 (27) Any special one-time permit under G.S. 18B-1002 – \$25.00.
8 (28) Winery special event permit – \$100.00.
9 (29) Mixed beverages catering permit – \$100.00.
10 (30) Guest room cabinet permit – \$750.00.

11 (e) Fee for Combined Applications. – If application is made at the same time for
12 retail malt beverage, unfortified wine and fortified wine permits for a single business
13 location, the total fee for those applications shall be two hundred dollars (\$200.00). If
14 application is made at the same time for brown-bagging and special occasion permits
15 for a single business location, the total fee for those applications shall be three hundred
16 dollars (\$300.00). If application is made at the same time for wine and malt beverage
17 importer permits, the total fee for those applications shall be one hundred fifty dollars
18 ~~(\$100.00)-(\$150.00).~~ If application is made at the same time for wine and malt beverage
19 wholesaler permits, the total fee for those applications shall be one hundred fifty dollars
20 ~~(\$100.00)-(\$150.00).~~ If application is made in the same year for vendor representative
21 permits to represent more than one vendor, only one fee shall be paid. If application is
22 made at the same time for nonresident malt beverage vendor and nonresident wine
23 vendor permits, the total fee for those applications shall be twenty-five dollars (\$25.00).

24 (f) Fee Not Refundable. – The fee required by subsection (d) shall not be
25 refunded.

26 (g) Fees to Treasurer. – All fees collected by the Commission under this or any
27 other section of this Chapter shall be remitted to the State Treasurer for the General
28 Fund."

29 Sec. 12. G.S. 18B-904(f) reads as rewritten:

30 "(f) Local Government Objections. —~~In any hearing in which the suitability of a~~
31 ~~location or applicant is an issue, a local government official may be designated by the~~
32 ~~local governing authority to make recommendations pursuant to G.S. 18B-901(b) and~~
33 ~~may testify at the hearing without further qualification or authorization.—The governing~~
34 body of a city or county may designate an official of the city or county, by name or by
35 position, to make recommendations concerning the suitability of a person or of a
36 location for an ABC permit. The governing body of a city or county shall notify the
37 Commission of an official designated under this subsection. An official designated
38 under this subsection shall be allowed to testify at a contested case hearing in which the
39 suitability of a person or of a location for an ABC permit is an issue without further
40 qualification or authorization."

41 Sec. 13. G.S. 18B-906 reads as rewritten:

42 "**§ 18B-906. Applicability of Administrative Procedure Act.**

43 (a) Act Applies. – An ABC permit is a 'license' within the meaning of G.S. 150A-
44 ~~2-, 150B-2,~~ and a Commission action on issuance, ~~suspension-suspension,~~ or revocation

1 of an ABC permit, other than a temporary permit issued under G.S. 18B-905, is a
2 'contested case' subject to the provisions of Chapter ~~150A-150B~~ except as provided in
3 ~~subsection (b)-~~this section.

4 (b) Exception on Hearing Location. – Hearings on ABC permits shall be held in
5 Ahoskie, Asheville, Bryson City, Charlotte, Elizabeth City, Fayetteville, Franklin,
6 Goldsboro, Greensboro, Greenville, Hickory, Jacksonville, Kinston, New Bern, Raleigh,
7 Statesville, Wilmington, and Winston-Salem. Hearings shall be held within 100 miles,
8 as best can be determined by the Commission, of the county seat of the county in which
9 the licensed business or proposed business is located. The hearing may be held,
10 however, at any place upon agreement of the Commission and all other parties.

11 (c) Exception on New Evidence. – In making a final decision in a contested case
12 in which an issue is whether to deny an application for an ABC permit because either
13 the applicant or the location for the proposed ABC permit is unsuitable, the Commission
14 may hear evidence of acts that occurred after the date the contested case hearing was
15 held if the evidence is admissible under G.S. 150B-29(a). New evidence heard under
16 this subsection is not grounds for reversal or remand under G.S. 150B-51(a)."

17 Sec. 14. G.S. 18B-1000 is amended by inserting a new subdivision in the
18 appropriate alphabetical order to read:

19 "(5a) Residential private club. – A private club that is located in a privately
20 owned, primarily residential and recreational development."

21 Sec. 15. G.S. 18B-1000(8) reads as rewritten:

22 "(8) Sports club. – An establishment substantially engaged in the business
23 of providing athletic facilities, an 18-hole golf course, a tennis court, or
24 both. The sports club can either be open to the general public or for to
25 members and their guests. ~~Sports clubs shall only include golf courses.~~
26 To qualify as a sports club, an establishment's gross receipts for club
27 activities shall be greater than its gross receipts for alcoholic
28 beverages. This provision does not prohibit a sports club from
29 operating a restaurant. Receipts for food shall be included in with the
30 club activity fee."

31 Sec. 16. G.S. 18B-1004(e) reads as rewritten:

32 "(e) This section does not prohibit at any time the wholesale delivery and sale of
33 unfortified wine, fortified wine, and malt beverages to retailers issued permits pursuant
34 to ~~G.S. 18B-1001.~~ G.S. 18B-1001 or G.S. 18B-1002(a)(2) or (5)."

35 Sec. 17. G.S. 18B-1006(h) reads as rewritten:

36 "(h) Purchase Restrictions. – A retail permittee may purchase malt beverages,
37 unfortified wine, or fortified wine only from a wholesaler ~~or importer~~ who maintains a
38 place of business in this State and has the proper permit."

39 Sec. 18. G.S. 18B-1006(j) reads as rewritten:

40 "(j) Recreation/Sports Recreation Districts. – The ~~Notwithstanding the provisions~~
41 of Article 6 of this Chapter, the Commission may issue permits for the sale of malt
42 beverages and beverages, unfortified wine-wine, fortified wine, and mixed beverages to
43 qualified businesses in a recreation in recreation/sports districts when they are wholly
44 located in a County where there are two or more municipalities that are wholly located in the

1 County that allow the sale of alcoholic beverages while the sale of any alcoholic beverages is
2 prohibited in the nonincorporated areas of the County, and the area to be included in the
3 recreation/sports district has been previously identified by one of those municipalities through a
4 resolution of intent for annexation. The issuance of the permits shall be upon the formal written
5 request of the City indicating the intent to annex the area or upon formal written request of the

18 located within a private club located in a private development, 18B-1001, without approval
19 at an election; election, to a residential private club or a sports club that is located in a
20 county that meets the requirements set in any of the following subdivisions:

21 (1) In any county which has Has a population of less than 45,000 by the last
22 federal census, and in which there are has at least three but not more
23 than four cities that have approved the sale of malt beverages or

42 invitation of the club's board of directors and the guests of these members."

43 Sec. 20. G.S. 18B-1104(7) reads as rewritten:

44 "(7) In areas where the sale is legal, sell the brewery's malt beverages at the
45 brewery upon receiving a permit under G.S. 18B-1001(1). The

1 brewery also may obtain a malt beverage wholesaler permit to sell,
2 deliver, and ship at wholesale only malt beverages manufactured by
3 the brewery. ~~This~~The authorization of this subdivision applies to a
4 brewery that sells, to consumers at the brewery, to wholesalers, to
5 retailers, and to exporters, fewer than 310,000 gallons of malt
6 beverages produced by it per year."

7 Sec. 21. G.S. 18B-1106(a) reads as rewritten:

8 "(a) Authorization. – The holder of a wine importer permit may:

- 9 (1) Import fortified and unfortified wines from outside the United States in
10 closed containers;
11 (2) Store those wines;
12 (3) Sell those wines at wholesale to wine wholesalers for purposes of
13 resale."

14 Sec. 22. G.S. 18B-1108 reads as rewritten:

15 **"§ 18B-1108. Authorization of malt beverages importer permit.**

16 The holder of a malt beverages importer permit may:

- 17 (1) Import malt beverages from outside the United States in closed
18 containers;
19 (2) Store those malt beverages;
20 (3) Sell those malt beverages at wholesale to malt beverage wholesalers for
21 purposes of resale."

22 Sec. 23. G.S. 18B-1113 reads as rewritten:

23 **"§ 18B-1113. Authorization of nonresident malt beverage vendor permit.**

24 The holder of a nonresident malt beverage vendor permit may sell, ~~deliver~~deliver,
25 and ship malt beverages in this State only to wholesalers, ~~importers~~importers, and
26 bottlers licensed under this Chapter, as authorized by the ABC laws. The malt
27 beverages must come to rest at the licensed premises of a malt beverage wholesaler in
28 this State before being resold to a retailer. A nonresident malt beverage vendor permit
29 may be issued to a brewery, ~~importer~~an importer, or a bottler outside North Carolina
30 who desires to sell, ~~deliver~~deliver, and ship malt beverages into this State."

31 Sec. 24. G.S. 18B-1114 reads as rewritten:

32 **"§ 18B-1114. Authorization of nonresident wine vendor permit.**

33 The holder of a nonresident wine vendor permit may sell, ~~deliver~~deliver, and ship
34 unfortified and fortified wine in this State only to wholesalers, ~~importers~~importers, and
35 bottlers licensed under this Chapter, as authorized by the ABC laws. The unfortified
36 and fortified wine must come to rest at the licensed premises of a wine wholesaler in
37 this State before being resold to a retailer. A nonresident wine vendor permit may be
38 issued to a winery, a wholesaler, an importer, or a bottler outside North Carolina who
39 desires to sell, ~~deliver~~deliver, and ship unfortified and fortified wine into this State."

40 Sec. 25. G.S. 18B-1116(a) reads as rewritten:

41 "(a) Prohibitions. – It shall be unlawful for any manufacturer, bottler, or
42 wholesaler of any alcoholic beverages, or for any officer, director, or affiliate thereof,
43 either directly or indirectly to:

- 1 (1) Require that an alcoholic beverage retailer purchase any alcoholic
2 beverages from that person to the full or partial exclusion of any other
3 alcoholic beverages offered for sale by other persons in this State; or
4 (2) Have any direct or indirect financial interest in the business of any
5 alcoholic beverage retailer in this State or in the premises where the
6 business of any alcoholic beverage retailer in this State is conducted;
7 or
8 (3) Lend or give to any alcoholic beverage retailer in this State or his
9 employee or to the owner of the premises where the business of any
10 alcoholic beverage retailer in this State is conducted, any money,
11 service, equipment, furniture, fixtures or any other thing of value.

12 A brewery qualifying under G.S. 18B-1104(7) to act as a wholesaler or retailer
13 of its own malt beverages is not subject to the provisions of this subsection concerning
14 financial interests in, and lending or giving things of value to, a wholesaler or retailer
15 with respect to the brewery's transactions with the retail business on its premises. The
16 brewery is subject to the provisions of this subsection, however, with respect to its
17 transactions with all other wholesalers and retailers."

18 Sec. 26. G.S. 105-113.68(a)(13) reads as rewritten:

- 19 "(13) 'Wholesaler or importer' when used with reference to wholesalers
20 or importers of wine or malt beverages includes resident wineries
21 that sell their wines at retail and resident breweries that produce
22 fewer than ~~62,000~~ 310,000 gallons of malt beverages per year."

23 Sec. 27. G.S. 18B-805(c)(2) reads as rewritten:

- 24 "(2) The local board shall spend for law enforcement an amount set by
25 the board which shall be at least five percent (5%) of the gross
26 receipts remaining after the distribution required by subdivision
27 (1). The local board may contract with the ALE Division to provide
28 the law enforcement required by this subdivision. Notwithstanding
29 the provisions of any local act, this provision shall apply to all local
30 boards."

31 Sec. 28. Section 11 of this act becomes effective September 1, 1993, and
32 applies to applications for ABC permits filed on or after that date. The remaining
33 sections of this act are effective upon ratification.
