AN ACT TO DIRECT THE STATE BOARD OF EDUCATION TO REEVALUATE	
THE GRADUATION RULES FOR CHILDREN WITH SPECIAL NEEDS AND	
TO SUSPEND THE APPLICATION OF OLD RULES PENDING THE	
REEVALUATION. The Congress Aggreembly of North Caroline angets:	
The General Assembly of North Carolina enacts: Section 1. G.S. 115C-81(b) reads as rewritten:	
"(b) The Basic Education Program shall include course requirements and	
descriptions similar in format to materials previously contained in the standard course of	
study and it shall provide:

(12) Any other information the Board considers appropriate and necessary."

Sec. 2. The State Board of Education shall authorize an independently conducted study, to include recommendations of graduation standards and children with special needs, with a particular focus on appropriate modifications of these standards for these children. The study shall be conducted within existing resources of the State Board of Education and shall include a review and evaluation of other states' graduation standards and how they are modified for these children, the appropriateness of an alternative diploma for these children, the appropriateness of course substitutions or waivers for these children, the need for raised expectations for these children in conjunction with alternative teaching methods, the admissions policies at the constituent institutions of The University of North Carolina as they apply to these students, and any other issue the State Board of Education considers appropriate. The study shall be completed and a written report filed with the State Board of Education no later than December 15, 1993. Upon its receipt of the report, the State Board of Education shall file a copy with the chair of the Commission on Children with Special Needs and the chairs of the Joint Legislative Education Oversight Committee.

Sec. 3. The effective date of any rule adopted by the State Board of Education in the two years immediately preceding December 15, 1993, that established additional graduation standards is suspended in any application to children identified as learning disabled. The State Board of Education shall establish a new effective date for the rules it decides to keep or modify after it completes the reevaluation required by Section 4 of this act.

Sec. 4. Upon its receipt of the report authorized under Section 2 of this act, and based on its recommendations, the State Board of Education shall reevaluate any rules it established within the two years immediately preceding December 15, 1993, that established or affected graduation requirements, with a particular focus on the Algebra I requirement. The State Board of Education shall complete its reevaluation and establish any modifications to these rules on or before March 15, 1994. Upon completion of this process, the State Board of Education shall file a written report with the chair of the Commission on Children with Special Needs and the chairs of the Joint Legislative Education Oversight Committee no later than April 1, 1994.

Sec. 5. This act is effective upon ratification.
