6	"(<u>h)</u> Char	acter Education. – Local boards of education shall require the teaching of		
7	the following cl	haracter traits in the public schools:		
8	<u>(1)</u>	Courage. – Having the determination to do the right thing even when		
9		others don't and the strength to follow your conscience rather than the		
10		crowd; and attempting difficult things that are worthwhile.		
11	<u>(2)</u>	Good judgment. – Choosing worthy goals and setting proper priorities:		
12		thinking through the consequences of your actions; and basing decisions		
13		on practical wisdom and good sense.		
14	<u>(3)</u>	<u>Integrity. – Having the inner strength to be truthful, trustworthy, and</u>		
15		honest in all things; acting justly and honorably.		
16	<u>(4)</u>	Kindness. – Being considerate, courteous, helpful, and understanding of		
17		others; showing care, compassion, friendship, and generosity; and		
18		treating others as you would like to be treated.		
19	<u>(5)</u>	Perseverance. – Being persistent in the pursuit of worthy objectives in		
20		spite of difficulty, opposition, or discouragement; and exhibiting		

1		patience and having the fortitude to try again when confronted with
2		delays, mistakes, or failures.
3	<u>(6)</u>	Respect. – Showing high regard for authority, for other people, for self,
4		for property, and for country; and understanding that all people have
5		value as human beings.
6	<u>(7)</u>	Responsibility Being dependable in carrying out obligations and
7		duties; showing reliability and consistency in words and conduct; being
8		accountable for your own actions; and being committed to active
9		involvement in your community.
10	<u>(8)</u>	Self-Discipline Demonstrating hard work and commitment to
11		purpose; regulating yourself for improvement and restraining from
12		inappropriate behaviors; being in proper control of your words, actions,
13		impulses, and desires; choosing abstinence from premarital sex, drugs,
14		alcohol, tobacco, and other harmful substances and behaviors; and doing
15		your best in all situations."
