A BILL TO BE ENTITLED
AN ACT RECOMMENDED BY THE CHILD FATALITY TASK FORCE TO
BROADEN THE ACCESS TO CONFIDENTIAL RECORDS FOR THE
PURPOSES OF CHILD FATALITY REVIEW AND PREVENTION.
The General Assembly of North Carolina enacts:
Section 1. G.S. 143-578 reads as rewritten:
"§ 143-578. Access to records.
(a) The Chair of the State Team, a Local Team, or the Task Force during its
existence, may make a written demand for any information or reports, whether or not
confidential, that may in the Chair's opinion be relevant to a review of a child's death or
maltreatment pursuant to this Article. Upon the Chair's request, and unless protected by
the attorney-client privilege, any public or private agency or individual shall provide
access to and copies of this confidential information and these records to the extent
permitted by federal law and regulations. Any public or private agency or individual
acting in good faith in providing this access is immune from any civil or criminal liability
that might otherwise be incurred or imposed. The State Team, the Local Teams, and the
Task Force during its existence, shall have access to all medical records, hospital records,
and records maintained by this State, any county, or any local agency as necessary to
carry out the purposes of this Article, including police investigations data, medical
examiner investigative data, health records, mental health records, and social services

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records. The State Team, the Task Force, and the Local Teams shall not, as part of the 1 2 reviews authorized under this Article, contact, question, or interview the child, the parent 3 of the child, or any other family member of the child whose record is being reviewed. 4 Any member of a Local Team may share, only in an official meeting of that Local Team, 5 any information available to that member that the Local Team needs to carry out its 6 duties. 7 The State Team, the Local Teams, and the Task Force during its existence, (a1) 8 shall have the power to issue subpoenas for any records set forth in subsection (a), which

9 subpoena shall be served in the manner and for the same fees as are now provided by law.
 10 The superior court of the county in which the State Team, a Local Team, or the Task
 11 Force meets shall, on application of its Chair or executive director, enforce by proper
 12 proceeds the production and examination of these records.

Meetings of the State Team and the Local Teams are not subject to the 13 (b)provisions of Article 33C of Chapter 143 of the General Statutes. However, the Local 14 15 Teams may hold periodic public meetings to discuss, in a general manner not revealing confidential information about children and families, the findings of their reviews and 16 17 their recommendations for preventive actions. Minutes of all public meetings, excluding 18 those of executive sessions, shall be kept in compliance with Article 33C of Chapter 143 of the General Statutes. Any minutes or any other information generated during any 19 20 executive session shall be sealed from public inspection.

21 (c) All otherwise confidential information and records acquired by the State Team, the Local Teams, and the Task Force during its existence, in the exercise of their duties 22 23 are confidential; are not subject to discovery or introduction into evidence in any 24 proceedings; and may only be disclosed as necessary to carry out the purposes of the State Team, the Local Teams, and the Task Force. In addition, all otherwise confidential 25 information and records created by a Local Team in the exercise of its duties are 26 27 confidential; are not subject to discovery or introduction into evidence in any proceedings; and may only be disclosed as necessary to carry out the purposes of the 28 29 Local Team. No member of the State Team, a Local Team, nor any person who attends a 30 meeting of the State Team or a Local Team, may testify in any proceeding about what transpired at the meeting, about information presented at the meeting, or about opinions 31 32 formed by the person as a result of the meetings. This subsection shall not, however, 33 prohibit a person from testifying in a civil or criminal action about matters within that person's independent knowledge. 34

(d) Each member of a Local Team and invited participant shall sign a statement
 indicating an understanding of and adherence to confidentiality requirements, including
 the possible civil or criminal consequences of any breach of confidentiality.

(e) Cases receiving child protective services at the time of review by a Local Team
shall have an entry in the child's protective services record to indicate that the case was
received by that Team. Additional entry into the record shall be at the discretion of the
director of the county department of social services.

42 (f) The Social Services Commission shall adopt rules to implement this section in43 connection with reviews conducted by Community Child Protection Teams. The Health

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Services Commission shall adopt rules to implement this section in connection with
 Local Teams that review additional child fatalities. In particular, these rules shall allow
 information generated by an executive session of a Local Team to be accessible for
 administrative or research purposes only."

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Sec. 2. G.S. 122C-54(h) reads as rewritten:

6 "(h) A facility shall disclose confidential information for purposes of complying 7 with Article 44 of Chapter 7A of the General <u>Statutes and Statutes</u>, Article 6 of Chapter 8 108A of the General Statutes, <u>and Article 62 of Chapter 143 of the General Statutes</u>, or as 9 required by other State or federal law."

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Sec 3. G.S. 7A-675(h) reads as rewritten:

11 Nothing in this section or in any other provision of law shall preclude the "(h) 12 necessary sharing of information among authorized agencies. For each juvenile who is alleged to be abused, neglected, dependent, delinquent, or undisciplined, the Chief 13 14 District Court Judge shall order State and local agencies, and their directors, members, 15 employees, and agents, to share information pertaining to the juvenile. The order may include local mental health facilities, local health departments, local departments of 16 17 social services, local law enforcement agencies, local school administrative units, the district attorney's office of the district, the Division of Juvenile Services of the 18 Administrative Office of the Courts, and the Office of Guardian Ad Litem Services of the 19 20 Administrative Office of the Courts. The order may direct the agencies to share 21 information with the juvenile's family if necessary to serve the needs of the juvenile and if not prohibited by federal law or regulations. Any information shared between agencies 22 pursuant to this subsection shall remain confidential and shall be withheld from public 23 24 inspection." 25 Sec. 4. This act becomes effective October 1, 1996. Sections 1 and 2 of this

act apply to confidential records being accessed on or after that date. Section 3 of this act
applies to adjudications of abuse, neglect, dependency, delinquency, and
undisciplinedness for acts committed on or after that date.
