SHORT TITLE: No School Employee Political Action

BILL SUMMARY:

House committee substitute replaces 1st edition. Changes title and completely rewrites act to define the appropriate political activity of public school employees. States generally that public school employees retain all the rights and obligations they possess as citizens under the Constitutions and laws of North Carolina and the United States. Prohibits public school employees from taking any active part in managing a campaign for political office or otherwise engaging in political activity (including using State funds, supplies, or vehicles to secure support for or oppose any candidate, party or issue in an election) while on duty or within any period of time during which the employee is expected to and is actually performing assigned job duties for which he or she receives compensation from the State. Specifies that when public school employees are not on active duty they may not have their rights to engage in political activity as individual citizens (including the right to seek or run for public office) interfered with by a local board of education, superintendent, principal or other school employee. Requires persons found guilty of the willful violation of this law to reimburse the local school administrative unit at the rate of \$.29 per mile for the use of any vehicles, \$.25 per page for any copies made, and for the actual cost of any supplies. Also assesses a civil penalty of up to \$500 which is to be credited to General Fund.
