Secti	on 1. The General Assembly finds that:		
(1)	In June 1997, a tentative settlement was reached in litigation between

Section 2. Article 1 of Chapter 143 of the General Statutes is amended by adding a new section to read:

### "§ 143-16.4. Settlement Reserve Fund.

- (a) The 'Settlement Reserve Fund' is established as a restricted reserve in the General Fund. Funds shall be expended from the Settlement Reserve Fund only by specific appropriation by the General Assembly.
- (b) Unless prohibited by federal law, federal funds provided to the State by block grant or otherwise as part of federal legislation implementing a settlement between United States tobacco companies and the states shall be credited to the Settlement Reserve Fund. Unless prohibited by court order, funds paid to the State or a State agency pursuant to a tobacco litigation settlement agreement or final order or judgment of a court shall be credited to the Settlement Reserve Fund."

Section 3. It is the intent of the General Assembly that federal funds provided to the State by block grant or otherwise as part of federal legislation implementing a settlement between United States tobacco companies and the states shall be used pursuant to specific appropriation for healthcare costs, tobacco transition assistance, and other purposes related to protecting the interest of North Carolina tobacco farmers, allotment holders, workers (including agricultural, commercial, and manufacturing workers), and other North Carolina citizens.

Section 4. Article 1 of Chapter 114 of the General Statutes is amended by adding a new section to read:

# "§ 114-2.5. Attorney General to report payment of public monies pursuant to settlement agreements and final court orders.

- (a) The Attorney General shall report to the Joint Legislative Commission on Governmental Operations and the Chairs of the Appropriations Committees of the Senate and House of Representatives on any payments received pursuant to a settlement agreement or final order or judgment of a court and credited to the Settlement Reserve Fund in accordance with G.S. 143-16.4. The Attorney General shall also report on the terms or conditions of payment set forth in the agreement or order. The Attorney General shall submit a written report to the Fiscal Research Division of the General Assembly.
- (b) This section applies only to executed settlement agreements and final orders or judgments of a court and does not affect the authority of the Attorney General to negotiate the settlement of cases in which the State or a State department, agency, institution, or officer is a party."

Section 5. It is the intent of the General Assembly to monitor the progress of federal tobacco settlement legislation and to enact appropriate income tax exemptions for financial assistance payments that may later be enacted by Congress for tobacco farmers and for others who depend on tobacco for their livelihoods. In addition, it is the intent of the General Assembly to monitor the status of tobacco litigation in this State and other

- states and to act to protect the interests of North Carolina tobacco farmers and other
