2	AN ACT TO ENACT THE EXCELLENT COMMUNITY COLLEGES ACT.
3	The General Assembly of North Carolina enacts:
4	Section 1. This act shall be known as "The Excellent Community Colleges
5	Act".

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29	I. STATEMENT OF LEGISLATIVE GOALS AND FINDINGS
30	Section 2. (a) It is the goal of the General Assembly that North Carolina
31	citizens benefit from a prosperous and healthy economy which (i) encourages the growth
32	of both new and existing businesses and industries, (ii) creates new jobs and nurtures
33	existing jobs, (iii) improves the quality of life, and (iv) produces revenues to provide and
34	support essential government services.
35	(b) The General Assembly finds that a prosperous and healthy economy
36	depends on the ability of North Carolina businesses and industries to respond effectively
37	to rapid changes in the workplace resulting from technology and competition in a global
38	economy. Building and maintaining a workforce capable of such responses creates two
39	new imperatives for increasing citizens' access to education and training:

4	(c) The General Assembly finds further that the State's investments in the
5	North Carolina Community College System have provided a basic infrastructure which is
6	poised to address these critical needs for education and training. With adequate funding,
7	community colleges are capable of meeting the workforce development needs of the
8	State. In order to maintain and improve existing programs and meet the additional
9	demands for education and training, the North Carolina Community College System must
10	address needs in four essential areas:
11	(1) Capacity to respond to emerging workforce training needs of business
12	and industry;
13	(2) Capacity to respond to employers' needs for essential basic skills;
14	(3) Ability to provide academic and skill preparation for the future; and
15	(4) Ability to provide quality education and training with state-of-the-art
16	technology, equipment, and books.

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C. ABILITY TO PROVIDE ACADEMIC AND SKILL PREPARATION FOR THE FUTURE

7 Section 5. Associate degree, diploma, and certificate curriculum programs 8 designed to prepare people for employment or transfer to a higher-level degree represent 9 the primary gateway to employability and economic self-sufficiency. Funds in this area will enhance community colleges' capacity and flexibility to serve people and 10 communities by fostering new program development, enhancing existing associate 11 12 degree, diploma, and certificate programs, integrating workplace skills into the curriculum, and offsetting high costs in vital high technology fields; therefore, there is 13 14 appropriated from the General Fund to the Department of Community Colleges the sum 15 of sixteen million five hundred thirty-eight thousand seven hundred twenty-four dollars (\$16,538,724) for the 1997-98 fiscal year and the sum of thirty-three million seventy-16 17 seven thousand four hundred forty-eight dollars (\$33,077,448) for the purpose of 18 enhancing salaries and adjusting student-teacher ratios.

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D. ABILITY TO PROVIDE QUALITY EDUCATION AND TRAINING WITH STATE-OF-THE-ART TECHNOLOGY, EQUIPMENT, AND BOOKS

Section 6. Funds will provide cutting-edge, state-of-the-art technology, equipment, and books essential for effective, quality programs in all areas of instruction including curriculum, occupational continuing education, and literacy; therefore, there is appropriated from the General Fund to the Department of Community Colleges the sum of fifteen million dollars (\$15,000,000) for the 1997-98 fiscal year and the sum of thirty million dollars (\$30,000,000) for the purpose of purchasing new technical and vocational equipment and books.

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III. LEGISLATIVE OVERSIGHT OF IMPLEMENTATION OF THE ACT

33 Section 7. The State Board of Community Colleges shall report to the Joint Legislative Education Oversight Committee prior to October 1, 1998, on the impact the 34 35 funds appropriated under this act have had on the ability of each community college to implement the institutional effectiveness plan that is tailored to the specific mission of 36 each college and to meet the goals of the North Carolina Community College System. In 37 preparing the report, the State Board of Community Colleges shall include the data 38 submitted by each college for the 1996-97 and 1997-98 fiscal years, in the "Critical 39 Success Factors" report and shall focus primarily on program outcomes. 40
