 - "§ 143B-437.42. Creation of Authority and Commission.

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Creation. - The North Carolina Rural Internet Access Authority is created within the Department of Commerce. The purpose of the Authority is to manage, oversee, and monitor efforts to provide rural counties with high-speed broadband Internet access.

Southeastern North Carolina

Development Commission created in G.S. 158-8.3.

The Global TransPark Development Commission created in G.S.

The Authority is located within the Department of Commerce, but exercises all of its powers, including the power to employ, contract with, direct, and supervise all personnel and consultants, independently of the Secretary of Commerce and, notwithstanding any other provision of law, is subject to the direction and supervision of the Secretary of Commerce only with respect to the management functions of coordinating and reporting. These functions of the Secretary of Commerce are ministerial and shall be performed only pursuant to the direction and policy of the Commission.

- Commission. The Authority is governed by a Commission that consists of the following 21 members:
 - Six members appointed by the Governor, as follows: (1)
 - One named from the large incumbent local telephone exchange a. companies in North Carolina.

successors are appointed and qualify. A vacancy in an appointment made by the

Governor shall be filled by the Governor for the remainder of the unexpired term. A

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- vacancy in an appointment made by the General Assembly shall be filled in accordance with G.S. 120-122. A person appointed to fill a vacancy must qualify in the same manner as a person appointed for a full term.
- (g) Removal of Commission Members. The Governor may remove any member of the Commission for misfeasance, malfeasance, or nonfeasance in accordance with G.S. 143B-13(d). The Governor or the person who appointed a member may remove the member for using improper influence in accordance with G.S. 143B-13(c).
- (h) Compensation of the Commission. No part of the revenues or assets of the Authority shall inure to the benefit of or be distributable to the members of the Commission or officers or other private persons. The members of the Commission shall receive no salary for their services but may receive per diem and allowances in accordance with G.S. 138-5.
- (i) <u>Staff. The Rural Economic Development Center, Inc., shall provide administrative and professional staff support for the Authority under contract.</u>

"§ 143B-437.43. Goals and duties of the Authority.

- (a) Duties. The Authority shall set specific targets and milestones to achieve the goals and objectives set out in subsection (b) of this section. The Authority shall coordinate activities, conduct or sponsor research, and recommend and advocate actions, including regulatory and legislative actions, to achieve its goals and objectives. The Authority shall also propose funding that may be needed from the Rural Redevelopment Authority established in Part 2D of this Article and from other appropriate sources for incentives for the private sector to make necessary investments to achieve the Authority's goals and objectives.
 - (b) Goals. The goals and objectives of the Authority are:
 - (1) Local dial-up Internet access provided from every telephone exchange within one year.
 - (2) <u>High-speed Internet access available to every citizen of North Carolina within three years, at prices in rural counties that are comparable to prices in urban North Carolina.</u>
 - (3) Two pilot Telework Centers in either enterprise tier one or enterprise tier two area established by January 1, 2002.
 - (4) Significant increases in ownership of computers, related web devices, and Internet subscriptions promoted throughout North Carolina.
 - (5) Accurate, current, and complete information provided through the Internet to citizens about the availability of present telecommunications and Internet services with periodic updates on the future deployment of new telecommunications and Internet services.
 - (6) Development of government Internet applications promoted to make citizen interactions with government agencies and services easier and more convenient and to facilitate the delivery of more comprehensive programs including training, education, and health care.

1	(7) Open technology approaches employed to encourage all potentia
2	providers to participate in the implementation of high-speed Internet
3	access with no technology bias.
4	"§ 143B-437.44. Powers of Authority.
5	The Authority shall have all necessary powers to carry out its duties including, but no
6	limited to, accepting funds offered to it for accomplishing its duties and performing its
7	administrative operations. The Authority may also advocate before the General
8	Assembly draft legislation to further the goals of rural Internet access."
9	Section 2. G.S. 120-123 is amended by adding a new subdivision to read:
10	"(70) The Rural Internet Access Authority created in Part 2E of Article 10 of
11	Chapter 143B of the General Statutes."
12	Section 3. This act does not obligate the General Assembly to appropriate
13	funds.
14	Section 4. This act is effective when it becomes law. The Rural Internet
15	Access Authority created in this act is dissolved effective three years after the first
16	meeting of its Commission. This act is repealed effective when the Rural Internet Access
17	Authority is dissolved.
