PART II. STATUTORY AND SESSION LAW CHANGES

Section 2.1. Section 1 of S.L. 1997-40 reads as rewritten:

"Section 1. The Study Commission on the Future of Electric Service in North Carolina is created. The Commission shall consist of ~~23~~24 voting members as follows:

- (1) Six members of the Senate to be appointed by the President Pro Tempore of the Senate;
- (2) Six members of the House of Representatives to be appointed by the Speaker of the House of Representatives;
- (3) The Chief Executive Officer of the North Carolina Electric Membership Corporation or the Chief Executive Officer's designee;
- (4) The Chief Executive Officer of ElectriCities of North Carolina or the Chief Executive Officer's designee;
- (5) The Chief Executive Officer of Duke Power Company or the Chief Executive Officer's designee;
- (6) The Chief Executive Officer of Carolina Power and Light Company or the Chief Executive Officer's designee;
- (6a) The Chief Executive Officer of North Carolina Power Company or the Chief Executive Officer's designee;
- (7) Two residential consumers of electricity, one to be appointed by the President Pro Tempore of the Senate and one to be appointed by the Speaker of the House of Representatives;
- (8) One commercial consumer of electricity to be appointed by the President Pro Tempore of the Senate;
- (9) Two industrial consumers of electricity, one to be appointed by the Speaker of the House of Representatives and one to be appointed by the President Pro Tempore of the Senate;
- (10) One member of the environmental community to be appointed by the Governor; and
- (11) One person representing a nationwide electric power marketer to be appointed by the Speaker of the House of Representatives.

The President Pro Tempore of the Senate and the Speaker of the House of Representatives shall each designate a cochair from the General Assembly membership serving on the Commission. The Commission shall meet upon the call of the cochairs. A majority of the Commission shall constitute a quorum for the transaction of business."

Section 2.2. Section 3.2 of S.L. 1999-395 reads as rewritten:

"Section 3.2. Membership. – The Commission shall consist of ~~15~~17 members who shall represent, insofar as practicable, the diverse interests and geographic regions of the State and shall include individuals with expertise in tax policy, tax administration, and professional tax practice.

The Speaker of the House of Representatives shall appoint ~~five~~six members, as follows: ~~two~~three members of the General Assembly, one individual nominated by the

1 North Carolina League of Municipalities, one individual who represents business
2 taxpayers, and one public member.

3 The President Pro Tempore of the Senate shall appoint ~~five~~ six members, as follows:
4 ~~two~~ three members of the General Assembly, one individual nominated by the North
5 Carolina Association of County Commissioners, one individual who represents
6 nonbusiness taxpayers, and one public member.

7 The Governor shall appoint five members, as follows: one individual who represents
8 tax practitioners, one individual who represents nonprofit, charitable organizations, one
9 individual who has demonstrated leadership and expertise in tax policy, one individual
10 who represents senior citizens and one individual who represents small business
11 taxpayers.

12 Appointments to the Commission shall be made no later than August 31, ~~1999~~ 2000.
13 Vacancies shall be filled by the original appointing authority."

14 Section 2.3. G.S. 74C-4(b) reads as rewritten:

15 "(b) The Board shall consist of ~~10~~ 14 members: the Attorney General or his
16 designated representative, two persons appointed by the Attorney General, one person
17 appointed by the Governor, ~~three~~ five persons appointed by the General Assembly upon
18 the recommendation of the President Pro Tempore of the Senate, and ~~three~~ five persons
19 appointed by the General Assembly upon the recommendation of the Speaker of the
20 House of Representatives. All appointments by the General Assembly shall be subject to
21 the provisions of G.S. 120-121, and vacancies in the positions filled by those
22 appointments shall be filled pursuant to G.S. 120-122. One of those persons appointed by
23 the General Assembly upon the recommendation of the President Pro Tempore of the
24 Senate and all ~~three~~ five persons appointed by the General Assembly upon the
25 recommendation of the Speaker of the House of Representatives shall be licensees under
26 this Chapter; all other appointees may not be licensees of the Board nor licensed by the
27 Board while serving as Board members. All persons appointed shall serve terms of three
28 years. With the exception of the Attorney General or his designated representative, no
29 person shall serve more than eight consecutive years on the Board, including years of
30 service prior and subsequent to July 1, 1983. Board members may continue to serve until
31 their successors have been appointed."

32 Section 2.4. G.S. 143B-131.6(i) reads as rewritten:

33 "(i) The Commission shall make its recommendations by ~~September~~ March 15 of
34 each year that terms expire for appointments for terms commencing ~~November~~ July 1 of
35 that year; provided the initial appointments for terms commencing October 1, 1994, shall
36 be made upon recommendation of the Roanoke Island Historical Association."

37 Section 2.5. G.S. 160A-480.3(b) reads as rewritten:

38 "(b) Membership. – An authority shall have eight or ~~17~~ 19 members. Members shall
39 be chosen for terms as follows:

40 (1) Four shall be appointed by the General Assembly upon the
41 recommendation of the Speaker of the House of Representatives in
42 accordance with G.S. 120-121, at least one of whom shall be a resident
43 of the territorial jurisdiction of the authority, and at least one other of

1 whom shall have been recommended by the board of trustees of the
2 constituent institution of The University of North Carolina whose main
3 campus is located within the county;

- 4 (2) Four shall be appointed by the General Assembly upon the
5 recommendation of the President Pro Tempore of the Senate in
6 accordance with G.S. 120-121, at least one of whom shall be a resident
7 of the territorial jurisdiction of the authority, and at least one other of
8 whom shall have been recommended by the Board of Trustees of the
9 constituent institution of The University of North Carolina whose main
10 campus is located within the county; and

- 11 (3) If the territorial jurisdiction of the authority is a county where the main
12 campus of a constituent institution of The University of North Carolina
13 is located, then:

14 a. Four members shall be appointed by the board of commissioners
15 of that county, one of whom at the time of appointment is a
16 resident of the municipality with the second largest population in
17 the county, according to the most recent decennial federal
18 census;

19 b. Four members shall be appointed by the city council of the city
20 with the largest population in the county, according to the most
21 recent decennial federal census;

22 c. ~~One member~~ Two members shall be appointed jointly by the
23 mayors of all the cities in that county.

24 d. The Chancellor of the main campus of a constituent institution of
25 The University of North Carolina within the county, or the
26 Chancellor's designee.

27 Beginning January 1, 1999, a majority of any executive committee, or other
28 committee however termed having supervisory or management authority over the facility
29 to be constructed by the authority, shall consist of authority members appointed under
30 this subdivision.

31 Neither the board of commissioners nor the city council may appoint a member of its
32 board to serve on the authority.

33 Two of the initial appointments under subdivision (1) of this subsection, two of
34 the initial appointments under subdivision (2) of this subsection, one of the initial
35 appointments under subdivision (3)a. of this subsection, and one of the initial
36 appointments under subdivision (3)b. of this section shall be for terms expiring July 1 of
37 the second year after the year in which the authority is created. The remaining initial
38 appointments shall be for terms expiring July 1 of the fourth year after the year in which
39 the authority is created. The third member appointed by the board of commissioners shall
40 serve a term beginning January 1, 1999, and expiring July 1, 2001, and the fourth
41 member appointed by the board of commissioners shall serve a term beginning January 1,
42 1999, and expiring July 1, 2003. The third member appointed by the city council shall
43 serve a term beginning January 1, 1999, and expiring July 1, 2001, and the fourth

1 member appointed by the city council shall serve a term beginning January 1, 1999, and
2 expiring July 1, 2003. Of the two appointments made by the General Assembly in 1999
3 and quadrennially thereafter upon the recommendation of the Speaker of the House of
4 Representatives, one shall be the person recommended by the board of trustees of the
5 constituent institution of The University of North Carolina whose main campus is located
6 within the county. Of the two appointments made by the General Assembly in 1999 and
7 quadrennially thereafter upon the recommendation of the President Pro Tempore of the
8 Senate, one shall be the person recommended by the board of trustees of the constituent
9 institution of The University of North Carolina whose main campus is located within the
10 county. The second member appointed under subdivision (3)c. of this section shall serve
11 an initial term expiring July 1, 2003. Successors shall be appointed in the same manner
12 for four-year terms. A member may be removed by the appointing authority for cause.
13 Vacancies occurring in the membership of the authority shall be filled by the remaining
14 members."

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16 PART III. EFFECTIVE DATE

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18 Section 3.1. Unless otherwise specified, all appointments made by this act are
19 for terms to begin July 1, 2000.

20 Section 3.2. This act is effective when it becomes law.
