A BILL TO BE ENTITLED
AN ACT TO AUTHORIZE THE DEPARTMENT OF TRANSPORTATION TO
PERMIT ENCROACHMENT ON ITS RIGHTS-OF-WAY FOR THE

CONSTRUCTION OF PRIVATE BRIDGES.

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The General Assembly of North Carolina enacts:

SECTION 1. G.S. 136-18 is amended by adding a new subdivision to read: 6 7 "(36) To permit private use of and encroachment upon the right-of-way of a State highway or road for the purpose of construction and maintenance 8 of a privately owned bridge for pedestrians or motor vehicles, if the 9 bridge shall not unreasonably interfere with or obstruct the public use 10 of the right-of-way. Any encroachment authorized by this subdivision 11 shall be approved by the Board of Transportation, upon a finding that 12 the encroachment is necessary and appropriate, in the sole discretion of 13 the Board. Locations, plans, and specifications for any pedestrian or 14 vehicular bridge authorized by the Board for construction pursuant to 15 this subdivision shall be approved by the Department of 16 Transportation. For any bridge subject to this subdivision, the 17 Department shall retain the right to reject any plans, specifications, or 18 materials used or proposed to be used, inspect and approve all 19 20 materials to be used, supervise the construction, and require the replacement, reconstruction, repair, or demolition of any partially or 21 wholly completed bridge that, in the sole discretion of the Department, 22 is unsafe or substandard in design or construction. The Department 23 shall ensure that any bridge constructed pursuant to this subdivision is 24 regularly inspected for safety. Any bridge authorized and constructed 25 pursuant to this subdivision shall be subject to all other rules and 26 conditions of the Department of Transportation for encroachments." 27

SECTION 2. This act is effective when it becomes law.
