1 AN ACT TO CLARIFY THE ROLE OF CHARITABLE DONATIONS AND WRITE-OFFS  
2 AS COLLATERAL SOURCES FOR CRIME VICTIMS COMPENSATION, TO  
3 MODIFY THE SCOPE OF DEPENDENT'S ECONOMIC LOSS FOR CRIME VICTIMS  
4 COMPENSATION, TO CLARIFY THE CONFIDENTIALITY OF CRIME VICTIMS  
5 COMPENSATION COMMISSION RECORDS, AND TO REQUIRE SUSPENSION OF  
6 CRIME VICTIMS COMPENSATION PROCEEDINGS UPON REQUEST OF THE  
7 ATTORNEY GENERAL.

8 The General Assembly of North Carolina enacts:

9 **SECTION 1.** G.S. 15B-2 reads as rewritten:

10 **"§ 15B-2. Definitions.**

11 As used in this Article, the following definitions apply, unless the context requires  
12 otherwise:

13 ...

14 (3) Collateral source. – A source of benefits or advantages for economic loss  
15 otherwise compensable that the victim or claimant has received or that is  
16 readily available to the victim or the claimant from any of the following  
17 sources:

- 18 a. The offender.  
19 b. The government of the United States or any of its agencies, a state or  
20 any of its political subdivisions, or an instrumentality of two or more  
21 states.  
22 c. Social Security, Medicare, or Medicaid.  
23 d. State-required, temporary, nonoccupational disability insurance.  
24 e. Worker's compensation.  
25 f. Wage continuation programs of any employer.  
26 g. Proceeds of a contract of insurance payable to the victim for loss that  
27 the victim sustained because of the criminally injurious conduct.  
28 h. A contract providing prepaid hospital and other health care services,  
29 or benefits for disability.  
30 i. A contract of insurance that will pay for expenses directly related to a  
31 funeral, cremation, and burial, including transportation of a body.  
32 j. A charitable gift or donation by a third party, including a charity care  
33 write-off of expenses by a medical provider, regardless of whether  
34 the gift or donation is subsequently rescinded.

35 ...

36 (7) Dependent's economic loss. – Loss after a victim's death of contributions of  
37 things of economic value to his dependents, not including services they



1 would have received from the victim if he had not suffered the fatal injury,  
2 less expenses of the dependents avoided by reason of the victim's death.  
3 Dependent's economic loss will be limited to a 26-week period commencing  
4 from the date of the injury, and compensation shall not exceed three hundred  
5 dollars (\$300.00) per week.

6 ...."

7 **SECTION 2.** G.S. 15B-8.1(b) reads as rewritten:

8 "(b) All medical information relating to the mental, physical, or emotional condition of a  
9 victim or claimant and all law enforcement records and information and any juvenile records  
10 shall be held confidential by the Commission and Director. All personal information, as that  
11 term is defined in 18 U.S.C. § 2725(3), of victims and claimants and all information concerning  
12 the disposition of claims for compensation, except for the total amount awarded a victim or  
13 claimant, shall be held confidential by the Commission and Director. Except for information  
14 held confidential under this subsection, the records of the Division shall be open to public  
15 inspection."

16 **SECTION 3.** G.S. 15B-11(f) is repealed.

17 **SECTION 4.** G.S. 15B-14(b) reads as rewritten:

18 "(b) Upon a request of the Attorney General, the proceedings in a claim for an award of  
19 compensation ~~may~~ shall be suspended pending disposition of a criminal prosecution that has  
20 been commenced or is imminent."

21 **SECTION 5.** This act becomes effective July 1, 2011, and applies to claims  
22 submitted on or after that date.
