SENATE BILL 603

Short Title: Pesticide Registration Paper Reduction. (Public)

1 A BILL TO BE ENTITLED
2 AN ACT TO NO LONGER REQUIRE, FOR ANY PERSON REQUIRED TO REGISTER A
3 PESTICIDE IN THE OFFICE OF THE NORTH CAROLINA PESTICIDE BOARD, THE
4 SUBMISSION OF THE MATERIAL SAFETY DATA SHEET TO BE FILED WITH THE
5 PESTICIDE BOARD.

6 The General Assembly of North Carolina enacts:

7 **SECTION 1.** G.S. 143-442(a) reads as rewritten:

8 "(a) Every pesticide prior to being distributed, sold, or offered for sale within this State
9 or delivered for transportation or transported in intrastate commerce or between points within
10 this State through any point outside this State shall be registered in the office of the Board, and
11 such registration shall be renewed annually before January 1 for the ensuing calendar year.
12 Beginning in 1988, the Board may by rule adopt a system of staggered three-year registrations.
13 The applicant for registration shall file with the Board a statement including:

- 14 (1) The name and address of the applicant and the name and address of the
15 person whose name will appear on the label, if other than the applicant;
16 (2) The name of the pesticide;
17 (3) A complete copy of the labeling accompanying the pesticide and a statement
18 of all claims to be made for it including directions for use;
19 (4) If requested by the Board, a full description of the tests made and the results
20 thereof upon which the claims are based;
21 (5) In the case of renewal of registration, a statement with respect to information
22 which is different from that furnished when the pesticide was last registered;
23 and
24 ~~(6) A Material Safety Data Sheet for the pesticide; and~~
25 (7) Any other information needed by the Board to determine the amount of
26 annual assessment payable by the applicant."

SECTION 2. This act is effective when it becomes law.
